## Experiencing the roof of the world

A well known travel writer, Pico Iyer, recently wrote, "All of us travel in space in order to travel in mind...but many of the best trips involve what is really a journey in time. We move across centuries when moving across borders". The 19 members of the Mount St. Mary's - Los Angeles Guangzhou Sister City travel study group that visited Tibet in March would wholeheartedly agree with this observation.

The group, led by Katherine Whitman and Jeffrey Cheung, began their 13 day journey in Beijing and Shanghai where words like "new", "dynamic", "fast paced" spring to mind. However immediately after landing at Lhasa's new airport, life became slower quieter and more peaceful. Instantly one is struck by the vastness of the land, the monumental mountains, the paucity of people and the presence of prayer flags everywhere. Traditional Tibetan prayer flags are colorful squares of fabric with Buddhist symbols and sutras printed on them. These are strung together and hung outside temples and homes. As the flags blow in the wind the messages inscribed on them go out to all who see them.

In Tibetan the name Lhasa means the Holy Land. From almost every part of the city the Potala Place is visible. This citadel with its 1,000 rooms was both

the home of the Dalai Lama and the administrative center of a theocratic Tibet. Our intrepid group was delighted to find a small refreshment room after ascending the 13 stories. The view from the roof is breathtaking. The blue of the Tibetan sky is unique and unforgettable.

The weather in March is surprisingly pleasant with midday highs in the 60's, but evenings can go below freezing. Because there is little work to be done in the rural areas in the winter this is a time of pilgrimage to many of the holy places. Most sacred of all is the Jokhang Temple which is located in the center of Lhasa. The square in front of the temple was filled with supplicants prostrating themselves or filing around the temple in a clockwise fashion. Because we were the only western group in Lhasa we were the only ones in the temple at the time designated for foreigners. For Katherine and Jeffrey who visited the temple with the LAGSCA delegation in July 2004, the difference in the experience was overwhelming. To be alone and unhurried made the visit even more meaningful.

All the members of the group came away with a deep impression of the spirituality of the Tibetan people and in the importance their culture has for them. One person observed that although the people were materially poor they seemed so very happy and at ease, especially the children. Although traveling in Tibet is arduous there was a reluctance to leave.

The contrast between Tibet and Guangzhou defies description. We landed at Guangzhou's dramatic new airport and were whisked back into the 21st Century realities of noise, traffic jams and a hectic pace of life.

The Foreign Affairs Office graciously let us borrow Liu Liu (Alice), our 2004 Laurence Liu scholar, for a wonderful day of sightseeing, cultural exchange and a tour of a joint venture motor cycle factory. Old friends from the Foreign Affairs Office and the Guangzhou Public Relations Association joined us for an elegant farewell banquet.

# A Remembrance of Lilia Huiying Li

It is with a heavy heart that I respond to the request to announce the passing last November 7th of Lilia Huiying Li, my wife of 38 years and a founding member of LAGSA. In 1981, Lilia and I, together with the now late Mrs. Caroline Ahmanson and the late Lawrence Liu, as well as other founding members of LAGSA, succeeded in establishing sister city relationship with Guangzhou, then still widely referred to as Canton. Having lived in Hong Kong since 1947, Lilia was very helpful, since she knew Cantonese as well as Mandarin. In fact she was asked by the first Consul General to the West Coast, stationed in San Francisco, to interpret his Mandarin speeches into Cantonese, when he visited LA, to the local Chinese, who were mainly Cantonese speaking.

Born in Hunan as the daughter of a Christian pastor, Lilia Li managed to get an education, which she continued in Hong Kong. In 1956 she led a group of Hong Kong businesswomen to China, when the new government held a conference to woo back Chinese businessmen who had left China prior to 1949. Her speech was so outstanding that Mao Zedong himself invited her for a personal meeting. He asked her to report on the new China, relying on her own eyes and not on what others were saying. Thus, she began a most productive career of writing mostly in Chinese hundreds of articles and half dozen

books. Later she became a reporter at the United Nations.

At a US-China Peoples Friendship Association meeting in Chicago in 1975, I met her, and a year later, we were married. She moved to Los Angeles where I was teaching Political Science, specializing on East Asia, at USC. She began teaching there part-time, on the position of women in

China. She also established her own China Seminar, which was conducted mostly in Chinese, promoting US-China friendship and how to reach a peaceful solution to the question of the status of Taiwan. Together we made a number of trips to China, especially to Guangzhou as part of our contribution to the success of the goals of LAGSA.

Our beloved Chairman, Caroline Ahmanson passed away on June 21, 2005. Her passing leaves an empty place in our hearts. We will miss her presence, her leadership, her charming personality and most of all her guidance in developing the Los Angeles Guangzhou Sister City Association.

As a founder of our Sister City Association, she imbued us with the need to develop a warm, friendly relationship not only with Guangzhou but with all of China. Her name and reputation with the People's Republic of China lent an aura of importance and prestige to our organization and to our efforts. China viewed her as a staunch friend. Top government officials deemed it an honor to meet with her on their visits to Los Angeles. Her numerous trips to China delighted her many friends there as well as her official hosts.

Caroline's energy and dynamism carried her into many activities – governmental, cultural, diplomatic, financial, and social welfare. In all of these she was an inspirational leader, lending not only her name but also her knowledge, time and efforts to all association's undertakings.

Caroline, we will miss you. Thank you for your friendship. It was an honor to know you and to work with you.

JULY 2005 - THE ASSOCIATED PRESS PUBLISHED THE FOLLOWING OBITUARY FOR CAROLINE AHMANSON ON JUNE 23, 2005:

*Caroline Leonetti Ahmanson, a leading philanthropist in Southern California and the widow of financier Howard F. Ahmanson, died Tuesday of complications from Alzheimer's disease, according to her daughter, Margo O'Connell. She was 87.*

*Ahmanson was a board member of some of the largest companies and arts institutions in Southern California at some point in her life, including the Walt Disney Co., the Fluor Corp., the Carter Hawley Hale Stores and the Music Center. She also was one of the first women to chair a Federal Reserve Bank, overseeing the San Francisco Federal Reserve between 1981 and 1984.*

*Ahmanson was appointed by Ronald Reagan to a post on the president's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities. She helped found the Los Angeles-Guangzhou Sister City Committee for former Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley, a group that continues to promote business ventures in both cities.*

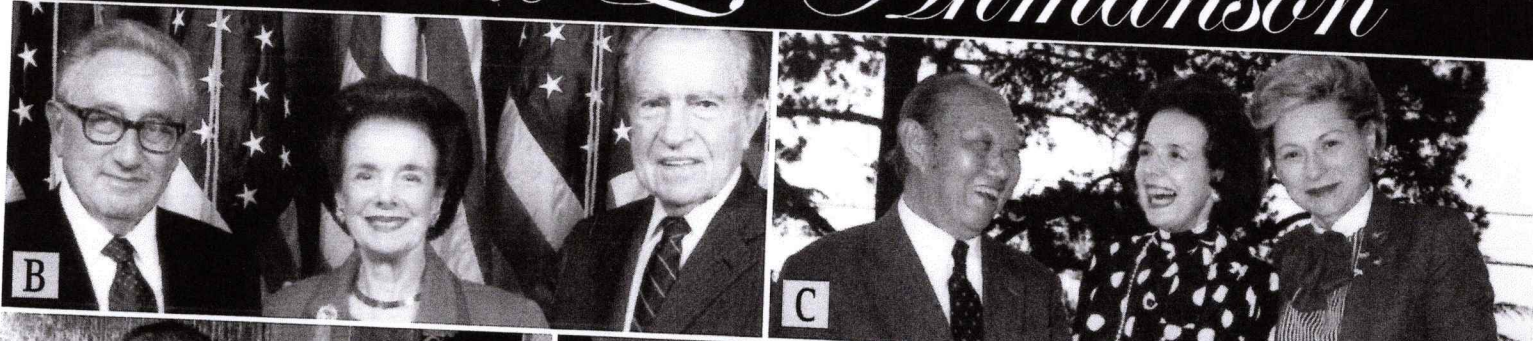
*She was a member of the board of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, the group that sponsored a visit by Chinese table tennis champions in 1972. That event was one of the early efforts to normalize U.S. relations with Communist China.*

*A close friend of President Nixon, and later of Reagan and their families, she served for several years as chairwoman of the President's Council of the Nixon library.*
